PLAR 2001 Overview

The course has been intentionally crafted to support students in completing their portfolios under the gentle guidance of an instructor. This step-by-step process takes place within a community of peers, offering students the opportunity to exchange ideas and gain new perspectives as they share their learning journeys. The environment is designed to be supportive and encouraging. Key themes are woven throughout the course, including the distinction between experience and learning, how adults learn most effectively, and the importance of reflection. In addition to developing a portfolio, students who successfully complete the course will earn three academic credits.

Traditional Route Overview

PLAR Advisors would offer guidance on portfolio creation and constructive feedback on students' drafts; however, the process remains largely an independent endeavor. The main tools to assist with portfolio creation would be an in-depth student handbook and resources on Moodle such as examples, templates, etc.
